

Comparing places, people and objects -- Comparative forms #1 -

Sometimes we want to **compare** two places, people or objects (to show a difference between them)..

To do this, we need to remember our adjectives:

e.g. small, big, hot, nice.


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That's because we use adjectives in a special way to make the comparison.

Look at these sentences:

- ✓ Jo is taller than Lin.
- ✓ Summer is **nicer** than winter.
- ✓ Dubai is **hotter** than Britain.

Taller, nicer and hotter are called comparatives.



How Do You Make Comparatives?

These are the first rules you need to know about making comparatives.

1. When the adjective has **one syllable** make the comparative form by adding -er.

Examples:

- long longer
- tall taller

But...

2. If the one-syllable adjective ends with an e, then only add -r.

Examples:

- nice cuter
- large larger

And...

3. For one-syllable adjectives that end with consonant+vowel+consonant, then you double the last consonant and add <u>-er</u>.

Examples:

- big bigger
- hot hotter

TOP TIP: Remember to include "than" in a sentence which compares two people, places or objects together.

e.g.

A Ferrari is faster than a Honda.

An elephant is larger than a cow.

A basketball is bigger than a tennis ball.
